

Children & Youth Programs

CATCH (Community Access to Child Health) Program

CATCH is a community development/community driven project that aims to improve child health and safety inside and outside the home and improve by engaging children, youth and families through programming and connections with community resources.

Healthy Babies, Healthy Children Family Home Visitor Program

Specialized team that helps families to identify goals and promote the healthy growth and development of children. They connect families with community resources and supports and work in partnership with a public health nurse.

Ontario Early Years Centres

Wesley's 8 centres offer a place for parents and caregivers of children, up to the age of six, to engage in their child's growth and development and receive support and information about their child's future years and their role.

School Age Program and Teen Drop-In Centre

Offers children age 6 to 12 and teens age 13 to 18 a safe and supervised environment which encourages learning and healthy growth. Includes help with homework, guidance and leadership as well as recreation opportunities.

Summer Camp and March Break Programs

Provides children, age 6 to 12, often from low income or at risk families, with opportunities to learn, play, and grow during school breaks, all at no cost to families who need it most. Offers caregivers the assurance that their children are safe, learning and developing vital skills and behaviours all the while provided with fun, supervised activities.

Wesley Child Care Centres

Wesley's 2 licensed, supervised centres offer care for children 2 ½ to 12 years that ensures children and youth have safe play spaces to build skills that will help them achieve their full potential. The care centres offer an opportunity to prepare children for school and social settings. Subsidies are available for families who require financial support.

Wesley Youth Housing

Offers 19 units of supportive and transitional housing for street-involved, homeless and at risk youth aged 16 - 21. Two phases provide different levels of support in order to help youth transition to independent living.

Youth Outreach Workers - Hamilton (Mobile)

Through the Street Youth Planning Collaborative, YOW-H serves 12 to 21 year old youth and their families in three underserved, at-risk communities in Hamilton. The team focuses on community development, engagement and referrals to existing services.
